# Colobrating THE CLASS OF 2023 LEAVING A LEGACY OF SUCCESS


It was a wonderful day to remember, as proud family members and guests gathered at Cold Spring Harbor Jr./Sr. High School on June 11 to celebrate the 60th Commencement of the Class of 2023. 






#### A Tradition Continues at West Side Moving-Up Ceremony






#### Lloyd Harbor School


