Students Experience the Future

IN NEW SCIENCE WING

A highlight of the start of 2024 was the much-anticipated opening of the new Science Wing at Cold Spring Harbor High School. Located on the backside of the science and mathematics wing, the design of the state-of-the-art modern glassed structure turned a vision into a reality and exceeds expectations.

The Board of Education and Superintendent of Schools Jill M. Gierasch would like to express their appreciation to the community for their support of the 2019 bond which funded the construction of the new Science Wing.

"Our community has always placed a high priority on providing all students with the skills needed to become tomorrow's innovators and leaders in a learning environment that mirrors the future," Gierasch said. "We thank the community for their continued support that enables us to provide incredible learning experiences for our students."

The Science Wing is now the center of science instruction, student research and exploration, with four

cutting-edge science classrooms and laboratories and a marine science lab suite that is host to a wet lab and coral reef propagation tank. Classes include a biology lecture and lab room, a hydroponic living wall and chemistry classrooms accommodating 12 lab stations. While the marine suite is slated for completion in fall 2024, students began attending all other science classes in the new facility in mid-January.

The Science Wing is wheelchair accessible, hosts cloud ceilings and adaptive opaque glass walls that fog at the touch of a button for privacy and all students to learn and conduct independent and collaborative research in an ultramodern advanced science research environment rivaling any college campus.








A Message from Your Superintendent of Schools Jill M. Gierasch

It's my pleasure to share with you the incredible achievements taking place within our schools, including academic recognitions,



Our students have been expanding their learning in our new science classrooms that officially opened in January funded by the 2019 bond. This space was designed to instill a sense of curiosity and inquiry among our young learners, preparing them for future academic and professional success.

Through various educational activities, we strive to empower our students with the knowledge and skills to learn from the past, take care of themselves and others, and to follow and achieve their dreams. To support our goals, we have hosted many CSH Unites events, including Black History Month, Holocaust Remembrance Day, P.S. I Love You Day and Red Ribbon Week.

As always, safety remains our top priority, and our protocols are continuously evaluated to ensure the safety of our students and staff. I am pleased to share that we have implemented several enhancements to our safety protocols already in place, including the changing of all exterior locks districtwide.

The decisions made by the Board of Education guide the district today and into the future. As we develop the 2024-2025 budget, the Board is considering the following issues:

- 2024-2025 Budget The Board is intent on continuing to offer a robust academic program that serves all our children and is weighing the effects of Gov. Hochul's proposed cuts to state aid on our budget.
- Use of 2015 Capital Reserve The Board is considering a proposition, for voter approval, to use the 2015 capital reserve fund to install a traffic control device at the Lawrence Hill entrance/exit at the Jr./ Sr. High School to enhance safety, and to install air conditioning in additional instructional spaces districtwide.
- Establish 2024 Capital Reserve Fund The Board is considering a proposition, for voter approval, to establish a new capital reserve fund to allow the district to set aside operational surplus funds for future capital needs. This would potentially enable the district to avoid future borrowing costs and budgetary impacts normally associated with long-term debt.

I hope you will join us at future Board of Education meetings. Together, we will continue to inspire excellence and make a positive impact in the lives of our students and the broader community.

Prestigious National MIT InvenTeam Grant Awarded



In spring 2023, several Cold Spring Harbor High School students approached research teacher Jaak Raudsepp about entering the Lemelson-MIT InvenTeam competition and submitted their preliminary application. They were one of 30 teams chosen to submit a final application. The students worked with the Town of Huntington and Suffolk County governments and the Cold Spring Harbor school community and confirmed that ticks are a local problem residents would like to see mitigated.

Cold Spring Harbor High School is the only high school in New York State and one of only eight high schools nationwide selected as this year's recipient of the highly competitive national Lemelson-MIT InvenTeam grant. CSH was awarded \$7,500 to create an invention geared towards active and passive tick mitigation strategies that do not require pesticides.

"We are honored to receive this prestigious national grant, which recognizes the outstanding research skills and dedication of our students and the district's commitment to providing our students with state-of-the-art STEM research opportunities," Superintendent of Schools

Jill M. Gierasch said.

"These high school students are not just problem-solvers of tomorrow, they are problem-solvers today, helping to make our world more equitable, healthier and safer," Leigh Estabrooks, Lemelson-MIT's invention education officer, said.

Under the direction of Mr. Raudsepp, the 14-member team is researching and developing a solution to reduce the number of ticks in the Northeast. Two subteams are working on different components focusing on determining semichemical excretions in mammalian sweat which have the strongest ability to attract ticks and developing 3D prototypes of the device that will contain the attractants, most effectively disperse the attractants and trap the ticks.

The team presented their Mid Grant Technical Review to the MIT Patent Review Board, and their final presentation of the prototype will take place during EurekaFest in June at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Microsoft also invited the team to apply for its Microsoft Make What's Next Patent Program, which offers diverse inventors patent support and mentorship.



Speech and Debate Team Honors – A Tradition of Excellence Continues

The Cold Spring Harbor High School Speech and Debate Team has been a proud part of the district's tradition of excellence since the 1990s. Under the guidance of head coach Dr. Michael Andrews since 1996, and assisted by assistant coaches Jeanne Glynn and Nicole Kearnes, the team currently has 114 members in grades 9-12.

Debate co-captains are seniors Saami Ali, Fiona Meier, Lance Schneider, Amber Zhou and juniors Charly Coden and Stephen Schmidt. Speech co-captains are senior Molly McHale and juniors Casandra Reilly and Sebastian Monterosso.

The team competes in local and regional tournaments between students representing more than a dozen competitive high schools. Team members are eligible for membership in the National Speech

& Debate Association, also known as the National Forensic League. Every year, the district's Speech and Debate Team has qualified students who have earned enough points to compete at the New York State Speech and Debate Championship. So far, eight students have fully qualified for the state championships: seniors Fiona Meier and Amber Zhou, junior Casandra Reilly and ninth graders Leah Bjorneby, Matthew Kammer, George Kitchin, Jessica Romano and Alex Wenk.

The district would like to acknowledge Dr. Michael Andrews, the recipient of the Foreign Policy Association's Judith L. Biggs Award for Excellence in Teaching. He was one of only 20 master teachers from Canada, Mexico and the United States to receive this prestigious recognition.

STRENGTHENING Our Campus

Say Something Anonymous Reporting System

The district continues to prioritize student and staff safety by instituting additional methods for communication in times of need. As of December 2023, CSH has implemented the Sandy Hook Promise Say Something Anonymous Reporting System at the Jr./Sr. High School which provides a confidential platform for students, staff and parents/guardians to report concerning behaviors or potential threats. The anonymity aspect may encourage students to speak up about issues they may otherwise hesitate to address, helping to identify threats to school safety promptly. Sandy Hook Promise, though, encourages students to approach trusted adults with their concerns through enhanced communication and collaboration efforts within the school. The goal is to cultivate a culture of collective responsibility and support, one in which everyone plays a role in maintaining a safe environment.

RAVE App

As we continue to enhance safety and security measures at CSH, administrators and staff have been trained on the utilization of the



RAVE Panic Button app which provides users with a quick way to alert authorities in cases of an emergency. The app allows users to quickly send alerts to designated emergency responders, including law enforcement, who are able to more efficiently locate distressed users in real time. The panic button feature can be activated discreetly, allowing users to call for help without drawing attention to themselves in dangerous situations. Although it is our hope to not be in a position of using this app, it will serve as an additional layer within our school system to strengthen our safety and security protocols.



Covert Investigations

In early winter, the district secured the security services of Covert Investigations. We are thrilled to have them join our security team. They have already made an impact, observing our practices, making recommendations for improvement and assisting in implementing the procedures. We expect continued advancements in the areas of training, incident response plans, real-time reporting of nearby incidents, hiring and support with our day-to day-functions. This team of professionals bring years of expert law enforcement experience and will continue to provide the support needed. Please welcome the men and women in the black jackets.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE NEW COURSES FOR STUDENTS IN 2024-2025

Course selection and curriculum writing and development are in progress for the following new courses which will be available to students when they start the 2024-2025 school year:

Pre-AP English 1 – This course will support the development of higher-level reading and writing skills that will pave the way for success in high school AP English courses (Seminar, Language/Comp and Lit/Comp).

ICE: The Play's the Thing – This senior English elective is an exploration of dramatic literature through theater of various genres, time periods and locales. Students will study the ancient Greeks, Shakespeare and contemporary plays.

AP Research – The second course in the AP Capstone experience, AP Research allows students to explore an academic topic, problem or issue of individual interest. This exploration culminates in an academic paper and oral presentation.

Advanced Marine Science – This elective course provides a deep dive into marine habitats, freshwater ecosystems, tidal zones and marshlands, and many other aspects of marine science. Local research will also be included along

with the use of the district's new Wet Lab.

Design and Drawing for Production -

DDP is an exciting option for students who are interested in creative problem-solving, engineering and computer aided design. Students who select DDP will create designs, build and test models, and work both independently and on a team.

Dr. Nicole Schimpf, the new executive director of special education and pupil personnel services, has more than 18 years of special education and pupil personnel administrative experience. She is a



After the unbelievable success of last year's districtwide STEAM Night, all expectations were exceeded during this year's STEAMANITIES Event, a perfect blend of STEAM combined with a deep dive into the humanities. With more than 300 participants, this year's grade K-8 initiative offered so many exciting activities, that each family received a map to maximize their experience.

Administrators, teachers, staff and more than 100 student-volunteers facilitated 31 fun-filled activity centers to test participants' problem solving skills, teamwork and creativity in managing the hands-on tasks. Students tested their engineering skills using catapults, centrifugal force art, chain reactions, circuit building, gears, Ozobots, marble runs, optical illusions and puzzles. Others gravitated toward booths including Boat Design, the Chemistry of Ice Cream, Slime Making, Volcanic Eruption

and more. Students also enjoyed participating in activities including storytime, puppets, poetry, the American Flag and a tutorial about Libby and audio/ebooks plus paper airplane challenges. The robotics team even demonstrated their robot maneuvers to future team members.

Thankfully, the district secured a grant through the CSH Educational Foundation to create the STEAMANITIES Event organized by a 19-member district technology committee led by Executive Director for Instructive and Administrative Technology, Joseph Monastero. Many of the supplies purchased can be reused for future STEAMANITIES events and in-school technology learning.
