


Supporting all Learning Platforms

For ten years, Teachers College (TC) staff developers from Columbia University have worked in partnership with CSH School District, providing on-site classroom demonstration lessons and professional development workshops focused on content and pedagogy. Due to COVID-19, these on-site lessons are now virtual and have not skipped a beat! Not only has Teachers College continued to support staff here at CSH, but they have taken it a step further by helping to support teachers with remote instruction tools. Interim Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum & Instruction, Lydia Bellino, shared, "Teachers College Reading and Writing Project at Columbia University compiled resources to support reading and writing with an emphasis to bring joy and fun into the reading and writing work you engage in whether at home or at school. We thank our staff development partners at Teachers College for this pivotal support during these challenging times." TC staff developers have zoomed into our in-person classrooms, as well as our 2-6 remote classes, to support teachers and coach students during the reading and writing workshops. Additionally, the TC video collections support phonics, study skills, vocabulary, abstract thinking and more, along with curated book collections designed

to engage readers young and old. This collaboration of supporting teaching in the classroom and remotely serves to enrich the curriculum for teachers. Exploring these learning practices and following the research and guidance of Teachers College, along with our K-12 Director of Humanities and the elementary principals, has afforded the district rich experiences in literacy skills.

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In this photo, West Side Principal, Alison Hazut, illustrates an example of 6th graders developing the central idea of a self-selected text through sorting words

(previously unknown) and finding the connections among them; a great example of the rigorous learning students are engaged in. Ms. Hazut noted, "The students exhibited tenacity and curiosity about the content while making meaning of these higher-level terms." Founded in 1887, Teachers College is the oldest and largest graduate school of education in the United States. □

In the world of research, a publication in a research journal represents esteemed recognition for the work and contribution to the field. I would also like to acknowledge that, Jaak Raudsepp, played a crucial role in pairing these students with mentors, as well as the development and guidance of these research projects." Aspyn Palatnick started his project as an 11th grader and has since graduated from both CSH Jr./Sr. High and the University of Pennsylvania. Aspyn was mentored by Dr. Michael Schatz at CSHL and Johns Hopkins University and his research was published in GigaScience. Aspyn was kind enough to include our high school as an affiliation. Sophia Ketterer (senior), Annabel Shen (junior), and Sophia Shen (junior) started their project during the summer of 2020. They were mentored by Dr. Constance Jeffery at the University of Illinois, Chicago. Their research was published in Nucleic Acid Research. All three students are continuing their research and are being mentored by scientists at Brookhaven National Laboratory, CSHL, and the University of Illinois, Chicago. Math Scholar Awarded

Talented math students at Cold Spring Harbor Central School District are strongly encouraged to apply each year. This institute was founded in 1992 to enhance mathematical and creative thinking skills for exceptionally talented students in grades 5-10. The Institute is tuition free, providing equal access to all qualified students from Long Island and promoting underrepresented populations in the mathematics, science and engineering fields. Students across Long Island sent in applications last February for an entrance exam in held in March 2020. Jakub is currently enrolled in the ICPS program for the 2020-2021 school year at SUNY which is being held entirely via Zoom. Congratulations Jakub!

RISE UP

Jr./Sr. High School: Recognizing good character in students is something to be celebrated. The "RISE UP" acronym symbolizes many core values into one to be recognized: Respect, Integrity, Service, Empathy, and being an UPstander. The goal is to help promote a positive school environment essential to the healthy development of young adults, and to recognize role models. Principal, Dr. Jim Bolen, started the official launch of RISE UP during the week of January 25, 2021 sharing, "The purpose of RISE Up is to provide a common language that captures who we are as a school community and the traits we most value." 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Robotics 2021 FIRST Competition



The anticipated January 9th date of the 2021 FIRST Robotics Competition Season couldn't

come soon enough for the CSH Robotics team. Mr. Carlos Rey-Martin, who has two sons in the club, has served as a mentor for the past three years (along with approximately ten other mentors), and took over as Head Coach and advisor this year. The 40+ member club (grades 7-12) has been meeting each week all fall, anxious for the big FIRST revealed on January 9th. The club has been cleaning up and reviving the 2020 robot, ordering parts, registering, and choosing administrative roles for all

the participants. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19, the robot teams will not be participating in live challenges this year but will instead compete virtually. This year's innovation challenge is entitled "Game Changers," powered by Star Wars: Force for Change. Students must design a solution, build a business model, and deliver a pitch to compete with other FIRST Robotics teams for judged awards. Students will participate in workshops and receive mentorship from experts. Teams will compete virtually in the Skills Challenge, illustrating their robot's technical qualities. Kickoff Kits were shipped, the Game Changers concept was announced... and they're off! The FIRST Robotics competition is an international high school competition which kicks off a six-week period each January to build a 125-pound robot capable of competing in the challenge put forth. FIRST is a robotics community that prepares young people for the future, and it stands for: For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology. Good luck CSH Robotics Club!

Goosehill first graders are learning how to code! Here, the children in Ms. Katz's class, are creating algorithms for screen-free coding on paper using arrows, scissors, and glue. They have to plan ahead to figure out how to move Ms. Urso's bitmoji to her favorite book. After mastering their algorithms, students are challenged to create their own coding problem for a friend to solve. Other students in the class are using the iPads to use code. org, a fun website that helps them to use their problem-solving skills to learn to code. The mix of iPads and screen free activities also helps students to learn about Digital Citizenship, creating a media balance of their online and offline activities.

Eric Carle Museum

The Cultural Arts Committee introduced a new event at Goosehill Primary School, in collaboration with Library Media Specialist, Marissa Urso, and art teacher, Laura Cirino. Parent representative, Mrs. Cunningham, arranged a virtual session with the Eric Carle Museum, located in Amherst, Massachusetts. The children zoomed in virtually and learned about picture book illustrations using collage. The museum included a video at Eric Carle's studio speaking to the children about how he organizes drawers of his own hand-painted papers by color. When he begins a new collage, he has his vast resource of papers at his disposal to cut and glue for his collages! The students have been learning about the artist and author all month to prepare for their virtual lesson with the museum, practicing



Although Eric Carle always loved to draw, he only began his book career in his thirties! He is now 91 years old, has illustrated over 70 books, and is best known for *The Very Hungry Caterpillar*.
