Superintendent Announces Retirement

I have learned so much from all of you and have greatly valued our opportunities to dialogue, learn, and grow together as we have implemented new technologies, developed new classroom designs, provided mentoring for our newest colleagues, and yes, navigated the reopening of our schools during a pandemic." Mr. Fenter joined CSHSD in July of 2016 as the seventh Superintendent of the District. He served a five-year tenure, during which he extended his love for education, dedication and commitment to the students throughout the years. He shared, "I would like to thank all of you for your kindness and support. I believe that the Cold Spring Harbor School District is a special place largely because of the talents of our leaders, teachers, and support staff, as

Science Research program at the high school; implementation of the 1:1 Chromebook initiative; enhancement of our building security and procedures; and the reopening of school during the pandemic.

Assistant Superintendent of Business, James Stucchio, shared, "Mr. Fenter's impact on Cold Spring Harbor Schools will be felt for a generation. Under his leadership, the 1:1 Chromebook initiative was launched: classrooms were transformed into fully flexible, student-centered spaces; and a bond referendum redefining instruction in the areas of science, technology, engineering, mathematics and the arts was approved by the community. His vision will help ensure our school system remains one of the best in the nation." It has been a privilege and an honor to have you as our Superintendent Mr. Fenter. National Merit Scholarship Program 2021

Congratulations to the following students for being named Commended and Semi-Finalists in the 2021 National Merit Scholarship Program. During the fall of their junior year, students across the nation take the PSAT, and the top scores are then established. The National Merit Scholarship Program, dating back to 1955, holds an annual academic competition identifying and honoring these high school students in the U.S. through recognition and college scholarships. Less than 3% of the 1.5 million students in 21,000 high schools who take this test will become a recipient of the awarded Letters of Commendation. Eight of our students



received the honor of *Commended* status: Matthew LaCapra, Arnaud Lamy, Sarah Lynch, Augustine Maiorino, Julianne Massa, Shane McAteer, John ReyMartin, and Sierra Rosado.

In order to truly appreciate how rare it is to then be identified as a *Semi-Finalist*, only less than 1% advance as a *Semi-Finalist*, and this year that honor goes to one student: **Matthew Ross**, who received this distinguished recognition at the high school. Superintendent, Robert C. Fenter shared, "We are very proud of our National Merit Scholarship winners, for this distinction recognizes the hard work and commitment of our students, the support they have received from their parents and teachers, as well as the community support for our fine schools." Reimagining Education CSH Begins Year With Hybrid

What exactly does hybrid education mean? Students began the school year following a hybrid model by reducing classroom occupancy to 50%. The students were divided into two groups (group A & B), alternating T/TH, or M/W/F schedules each week with in-person learning or remote at home learning. Classrooms were set up with Promethean Boards for live streaming in real time, so students at home are logged in and able to watch and participate in the class lesson from home. There are some families who chose full-time remote learning for their children, and those needs were met and set up accordingly acknowledging that each family must feel safe and choose what works best for them. All students are asked to take their temperature at home daily, and report the results electronically each morning. All staff employees must do the same. No parents are allowed in the buildings, and all staff must now access door entries electronically with their ID badges.

Superintendent, Robert C. Fenter, expressed, "I ask you to remember that teaching students in-person and at home simultaneously is a new experience for our teachers and to be patient as we work through many of the challenges they will invariably face." Thank you to all the teachers and the students for tackling and overcoming the many logistics and coordinated efforts to make all of this happen. With everyone's support, we will get through this together! \Box

Reopening Task Force *Thank you...*

To say that the job of reopening our schools was a herculean effort, was truly an understatement. Along with the guidance from the *NY State Education Department* (NYSED), and the *NY State Department of Health* (NYSDOH), a *District Task Force* was developed to determine the safest and most effective way to open schools with a choice of in-person learning, remote learning or a hybrid system. Thank you to the nearly 1100 parents who participated in the survey regarding the opening of schools, which began the process of determining what was best for CSH. The task force was comprised of a team of nearly 50 people, who led the charge working diligently to prepare for the various possibilities. The task force was divided into four different committees: Facilities & Transportation, Curriculum & Instruction, Health & Wellness, and Technology

Systems, each of which fell under the direction of administration, building leaders, faculty and staff... who then made their recommendations to the Board of Education. Thank you to the many dedicated individuals for the countless hours devoted to the task of opening school doors this fall, with the safety of our students and staff being the top priority and concern at all times.

The abrupt shift after the March 13th, 2020 closing of schools set into action a full-time remote learning platform in which no one was truly prepared. These unchartered waters were

navigated by dedicated teachers and staff with such care and support demonstrated to address the needs of our students. It was not easy! Transitioning from face-to-face learning to virtual learning was unprecedented. Superintendent, Robert C. Fenter, shared, "I have been in awe at the dedication with which our school community has rallied to make the return to school as successful as possible for our students and I look forward to a time when these approaches will no longer be necessary. As we planned for the return of our students, we all had images in our heads of what in-person, hybrid, and remote learning would look like. I think that it is fair to say that none of this is ideal – we would all want to see things be as they were, but, as we are reminded by a number of circumstances in school districts across the island, things will likely not be back to 'normal' for a good amount of time. We continue to ask for your patience and support, knowing for certain that in the end we all want the very same thing for our students while keeping safety our number one priority."



Timeline of My Life

COVID19 Time Capsules K-12

At the start of the school year, a district-wide initiative was implemented for all students to share their personal story of their time in quarantine. They were asked to think about their time in quarantine and answer questions such as; "How did you spend your time in quarantine?" "What did you learn about yourself, what have you gained and what have you lost?" Some students wrote a letter "to their future self," which will be given either at the grade 6 Moving Up Day for elementary students, or at their high school graduation for the older students. Denise Campbell spearheaded the project, explaining, "Our Health and Wellness Advisory Group was responsible for reviewing ways to address the Social Emotional Needs of our students as we re-open schools. The committee recognized the importance of students starting school in September in a way that acknowledged the shared experiences of our school community since March. The time capsule activity provided choices for students K-12 to draw, write, pho-

tograph or sculpt moments that represented experiences during this pandemic. This was an ideal way to help record an historical snapshot of this unique period in time." Students were also encouraged to write thank you cards to adults that worked so hard to keep

As I spent time in each of our classrooms on our first day of the hybrid model, I observed remote learners engaged with our in-person learners and their teachers in community building activities - quite an accomplishment. While the classroom experience has changed somewhat, our children were happy and eager to learn together. I witnessed teachers going above and beyond figuring out the best ways to make the technology work. It took everyone a much shorter time than anticipated to get acclimated; the children's resilience and independence shone through as I observed their patience and determination - It was quite something to watch.

With so much change, we were happy to hear the traditional "ringing of the original West Side school bell" echoing a moment of normalcy for all of our 227 students. We

are striking the balance between new and necessary procedures due to COVID19 with our important routines and rituals of regular school life. For example, our everyday morning assemblies are now conducted over Zoom to help bring our entire school commu-

nity together before the day of learning begins. Social Emotional learning is critical now, and we decided to begin our school year with the word "hopeful" as our September feeling word. Sports Postponed
