

Advanced Science Research Program

On December 5, three students from the Advanced Science Research Program at CSH High School attended the session on Genomes and Epigenomes at the “Plant Genomes, Systems Biology and Engineering” meeting at CSH Laboratory. In addition to listening to six talks by scientists from around the world, the students had lunch and discussions with two of the meeting session chairs, Dr. Jim Haseloff, from the University of Cambridge, England and Dr. Detlef Weigel, from the Max Planck Institute in Germany. Dr. Haseloff gave one of our students invaluable advice on their research project and offered to send key material. Dr. Haseloff also offered to mentor and collaborate with our students in the new field of Synthetic Biology. Meanwhile, other research students were engaged in intense discussions with Dr. Weigel and one of his PhD students. The students were thrilled to be invited to join a global collaboration to study the evolution of *Pseudomonas*. Advance Science Research teacher, Mr. Jaak Raudsepp, shared, “*All of the students had a very positive experience and returned to school energized to continue their research projects.*” □



just one hair-piece for a child suffering from long term hair loss due to alopecia areata or cancer. The children receive hair prostheses free of charge, or on a sliding scale, based on

financial need. *Locks of Love* is a non-profit organization that provides hair-pieces to financially disadvantaged children under 18 in the US and Canada. Advisor, Ms. Fristensky, has donated her hair seven times to date! A debt of thanks went out to Leslie Maduske-Diaz, owner of Leslie's Salon (Green Street, Huntington), who opened her doors for the third year to the students of Cold Spring Harbor, thrilled to participate in this important cause. Amnesty International Visit

On October 17th, CSH *Amnesty International Club* was visited by guest speaker Chrissy Forgione. (She is the cousin of teacher and *Amnesty International* club advisor, Ms. Halloran.) Ms. Forgione shared her experiences over the last 27 months, working with the people of Eswatini (formerly Swaziland) as a member of the Peace Corps. During her time in Eswatini, Ms. Forgione lived with a host family, learned the language of Swati, became immersed in Eswatini's culture, and worked with members of the community to improve where they live as they face poverty, unemployment, and gender-based violence. Students learned of their practice of polygamy which contributes to the countries epidemic of HIV and short life expectancy in adults averaging 57 years old. While the Peace Corp does not attempt to change the culture of the country, it does try to educate in order to prevent disease. Ms. Forgione told the students how she started a business with the natives (including 26 women and



4 men), built preschools, soccer fields, and ran camps for boys about gender roles and respecting women. Thank you, Ms. Halloran, for bringing these invaluable and profound learning opportunities to the students, and allowing them to learn about the Peace Corps, the culture of Eswatini, and the lives of its people. □

Analyzing Otzi

Otzi the Iceman is a fascinating new exhibit at the CSH Laboratory DNA Learning Center. Otzi is a 5000-year-old man who teaches us about DNA, our human inheritance, understanding our genetic ancestry and what makes us human!



Otzi's DNA determines his relationship and that of Neanderthals to modern humans. Through analysis of Otzi's stomach and intestines, many pollen types were revealed and studied to help scientists learn exactly when Otzi died. Fifth grade students studied pollen grains under the microscope with help from DNA Learning Center Educator, Ms. Capobianco. Prior to this, she led the students on a scavenger hunt which included skulls dating back 6 million years, skeletons and bones, bacterial illnesses, eye color, blood type and more! Students learned that not only pollen was found in Otzi's digestive system, but also wild goat, red deer, plants and wheat. Thank you CSH Laboratory for these amazing collaborations with CSH School District. □
