

US News & World Report's Annual List of Best High Schools







Students present KidOYO

What better way to learn, than to learn from students! At the February Board of Education meeting, administration and staff were proud to present and collaborate with KidOYO coding projects by students from grades 4-8. "OYO" stands for "On Your Own" and that is certainly what these brilliant minds proved as they demonstrated their coding skills on the Promethean Board to community members. KidOYO was introduced to students beginning this fall in grades 4-6 and 8 immersing themselves in the exploration of various languages of code, all in an effort to deepen their learning of computer programing. Throughout the year, students have been submitting their work anonymously to Stony Brook University via the KidOYO platform, which is then reviewed by graduate students who give feedback for improvement, or a badge for a successful submission. In basic terms, coding is problem solving. The students are quickly showing us that at a very young age, they are mastering these skills quickly and having fun doing it! Students must notate all their work and overcome road blocks and challenges. KidOYO challenges tell the students "what" to do, but not "how" to do it. The beauty is that they can all work at their own pace. School District staff not only visited off-site districts to explore and learn last summer, but they brought their knowledge back leading dedicated workshops at the Creative Learning Lab at Lloyd Harbor School during Superintendent's Conference Days. Thank you to trainers Mr. Monastero, Ms. Wetzel, Mr. Healy, Ms. O'Donnell, Ms. Fraiberg, and Ms. Diehl. Coding has also been introduced at the K-1 level, with Beebots and Kibo Robots...it won't be long before these students become student-teachers!

What happens when good people do nothing? That is the question Mr. Werner Reich asked students in grades 8 and 10, at an assembly where, at age 92, students were very fortunate to hear Mr. Reich humbly share his wisdom and experience of the Holocaust. Mr. Reich's personal story is one of incredible strength, hope and faith. He connected the atrocities he experienced as a concentration camp survivor, and how they are relevant in today's world to student stresses, injustices and cruelty stemming from prejudice, urging all to stand up to these injustices against others. He asked students to think about cyberbullying, teen suicide and tragic drug overdoses. He implored the students, "Don't be a silent friend." He told of the horrid tales he lived through where so many good people stood by while 12 million perished in the Holocaust; the bystanders, who watched both the bullies and the victims. He shared, "Evil will always succeed when good people do nothing. Today, we are not strangers to hate or prejudice, but we can all do something to help." We can do the right thing when we see something. We can be the first to act and speak up, but "Don't be silent," he pleaded. Thank you to Director of Humanities, Ms. Theresa Donohue, and the PTG Cultural Arts Committee for bringing Mr. Reich in as a guest speaker on March 3rd. It is our duty to never forget the atrocities of those lost to the Holocaust, and to honor Mr. Reich by paying his story forward. Thank you, Mr. Reich...for teaching us that we need more than tolerance, we need acceptance. \square
