# Board of Education "Meeting Highlights" October 8, 2013

# President's Report...

BOE president Janice Elkin's report included the following:

Welcome. One of the highlights of our meetings is when we have the opportunity to honor our students for their hard work and achievements in a variety of avenues. Tonight we have many students to honor. We honor them for their social conscience, their scholarship and their artistic ability. We would also like to congratulate West Side School on being named a Blue Ribbon School.

Tonight our focus on teaching and learning will be a very informative presentation by Mrs. Bellino on the Common Core Standards. The Common Core Standards have been written about in the local, state and national media, as educators navigate through their implementation and initial outcome assessments. Recently there was an article in the Sept 30th issue of Time magazine, which you can access through the library website, titled "The New Smart Set" which details the rationale for, and creation of the Common Core Standards, expected implementation difficulties and educational outcomes, as well as a look at the experience of the state of Kentucky which was one of the first states to adopt the Common Core and now is in year 3 of implementation. Kentucky experienced much of what is being experienced in local schools on Long Island, with testing assessment changing before implementation had time to mature. However, the message that came through loud and clear in the article was that what happened, or the shape of the road to implementation, depended in large part on district administration and staff. In the schools with the strongest leaders, teachers were given opportunities to study and discuss the new standards with one another and to brainstorm and reinvent lessons for the higher standards. These were districts where the administration, curriculum developers, and teachers embraced the inevitable changes that the Common Core required. I believe we are such a district. Tonight you will hear an outstanding, scholarly and practical presentation by Ms. Bellino in our Focus on Teaching and Learning. She will surely demonstrate how Cold Spring Harbor has embraced the new learning standards.

Parents have received NY State testing results along with a very informative letter from Dr. Wilansky, which also can be found on the website. The letter explains the differences in this year's assessments and scoring. Dr. Wilansky has made several presentations over the past month, so that parents can understand the consequences of the phase in of new assessment standards, and therefore be able to get an accurate understanding of their children's progress. The transition to the Common Core and the new testing protocols will take time and discussion and certainly has led to much debate and some anxiety among parents. We, as a board, thank the administration and staff in advance for their patience in taking the time to communicate openly, so that in the end we will, as a community, understand how the district can use the new standards to enhance the educational program our students receive.

On that note, the board sets annual goals in the fall of each year, and during the year we use our work session to hear reports related to the district's progress toward our goals. Last year some of our goals related to technology, the Dignity for All Act, the Common Core and APPR. We will once again be setting goals at our October work session. We invite you to attend and listen to our discussion of possible goals.

# Superintendent's Report...

# Good evening -

October is National School Board Recognition Month.

Lee H. Hamilton, long time Democratic Congressman from Indiana, has been quoted as saying:

# "I can assure you, public service is a stimulating, proud and lively enterprise. It is not just a way of life; it is a way to live fully."

This evening we take the time to recognize the members of the Cold Spring Harbor Board of Education for the gift of their service to our school community.

In my opinion, there has never been a more complicated time in public school governance. Think about the decisions that have needed to be made, just within the last year, with regard to:

- The recently regulated tax cap has placed a new constraint in balancing what constitutes a sound educational program for students through the lens of fiscal limitations and priorities.
- The implementation of the Common Core State Standards which has caused the inevitable ripples of anxiety and uncertainty that accompany any change in an institution.
- The experience of the recently regulated and negotiated Annual Professional Performance Review. While the accountability factor has never been called into question, the focus on state assessments (particularly in the early grades) has been at odds with the District's philosophy regarding the value of qualitative assessment, in addition to understanding students' developmental profiles.
- The continuing technological evolution which is impacting learning in such a significant manner, that our only assurance is to know that no classroom will, in a short decade, even remotely resemble the way teaching and learning occur today.

Our committed Board gets to grapple with all of these issues – for very little (if any) glory, no compensation and all too few thank you' s – so lest I forget – "Thank you!!"

You are among the most open-minded and thoughtful community members that I have had the good fortune to work with. You have the capacity to disagree with me or each other in the most civil and respectful of ways. You have always kept student welfare at the heart of every decision you make.

We require our students to engage in community service as a requirement for graduation in the hope that they will "reap more than they sow" – that they will come to learn that service brings a sense of fulfillment and self-satisfaction – and that those intangible rewards bring more to one's life than any other manner of compensation.

In an era where civic responsibility has substituted the gift of one's time for a monetary contribution - you are the models that we hope our students aspire to - the ability to make a difference through one's actions and commitment. Thank you for the gift of your service.
