Weekly Notes-September 11, 2015



Dear Parents,

Thank you for attending **Back to School Night** last night. In spite of the heat and rain, I am sure you enjoyed meeting your child's teachers and learning a little bit about your child's school experience. The teachers, staff, and I appreciate your involvement in your child's education. Our partnership will ensure his/her happiness and success in school.

Last night, your child's teacher described our school's grade level expectations. You may have been surprised at what your child is already learning to do and all s/he will learn to do this year. Our teachers are experts at designing instruction that builds children's skills in a gradual, but steady way. At the beginning of the year, they devote a lot of time to developing the foundational skills necessary for success. Children are learning to listen carefully, interact respectfully, follow routines, and implement procedures. Even the morning arrival time is filled with opportunities to develop these skills. Your child is learning to unpack his/her backpack, put notes from home into the teacher's basket, make a lunch choice, organize materials, and get started on a morning activity. The goal is to develop independence and a sense of competence so that our students enjoy learning and can achieve at high levels.

As adults, we know that it takes more time for children to do things for themselves than it does for us to go ahead and do things for them. We are tempted to unpack a backpack or put belongings away so that we can help them on to the next task. However, if we keep the goals of *independence* and *confidence* in mind, we realize that teaching and then expecting children to complete tasks on their own is well worth our time and effort. By *gradually releasing responsibility* to children and praising their efforts, we help them develop the capacity to follow instructions, make choices, solve problems, and complete tasks independently—all essential to their success in school.

You can support your child's developing independence by recognizing all of his/her efforts in school and then having him/her take responsibility for similar tasks at home. Here are some ideas:

✓ Have your child unpack his/her backpack when s/he gets home from school. Establish a routine for where notices go, where to put homework papers, and emptying the lunchbox.

✓ After completing homework, have your child pack his/her own folder and backpack for the next school day. Model for your child how you mentally check off what is needed. ("Homework folder? Check!")

✓ Involve your child in making decisions about lunch and snack. Look at the school menu together and talk about the choices. If lunch will be packed, plan the "menu" the night before.

✓ Lay out clothes for the next day. Allow your child to make simple choices from a set of options you are prepared to accept.

✓ Let your child participate in simple household chores, such as setting the table and putting away his/her toys.

Of course, things won't be perfect from the start! Children need support, patience, and time to learn new procedures and routines. They need acknowledgement and praise---even when they don't do the task perfectly! Ultimately, they will take pride in their accomplishments and you will see that your child is even more capable than you imagined. The greatest payoff will be your child's developing confidence and how s/he begins to take pride in being a contributing member of your family—just as s/he is becoming a contributing member of his/her classroom and school.



Registration is recommended. Space is limited.


