## LASTLY, I WROTE THIS ARTICLE AND IT IS ONLINE IN INSIDE LACROSSE...AND WILL BE A PART OF A PIECE IN LACROSSE MAGAZINE...Just my take on a sport I have been involved in since 1965...

#### **BRING BACK THE OLD DAYS**

I just got my recent issue of Inside Lacrosse Magazine and there smack dab in the middle of the magazine was a two page full page advertisement with the bold headline **GOAL**: **To Get Into A Great College**. It just put me over the edge.

The sport of lacrosse is growing and that is a good thing. The popularity of the sport is growing and the sport of lacrosse is reaching places throughout the United States and overseas. This is **GREAT.** 

Before, I go on my rant...I realize that the Great Sport of Lacrosse has changed...starting with the Recruiting Process. I realize I should focus on Current Events and not History...<u>But</u> here is what is not **GREAT.** Certainly not great for a multitude of high school coaches across the land. No longer is the high school coach the conduit for a student athlete to be recruited. Well maybe in some cases where the college coaches have strong relationships with the high school coach.

Every day, I get e-mails advertising this all-star event, this showcase event, this rising sophomore, junior, senior event. Top 205 is now Top 705. Then there are events to get into events. Try-outs to try-out like 3d Lacrosse... Preliminary events and then events. How about this: I see a letter sent to a sophomore student-athlete and the first sentence says: "You have been identified as an Elite Player and we are inviting you to our event. But here it is...You have two choices: go to Florida and try out or choose not to attend and but get selected for the premier event. Guess what...it costs you to attend the initial event and then it costs you to attend the premier event. Oh, but they do carry over the money if you get selected to help defray the additional cost to attend the premier event. What is a parent to do? Great marketing wouldn't you say. In the meantime this kid was on his Varsity high school team but played very little. And guess what every parent wants you to contact these events and put a good word in for their child. "Free Enterprise At Last-Free Enterprise At Last".

Then there are the local and regional club programs that elicit your membership telling you they have the best club programs, the best coaches, and the best schedules....Fall ball, Winter ball, Spring ball, and then Summer ball. There is the "Sting", the "Lightning", the "Express", the "Lizards"...the list goes on and on.

It all cost a great deal of money and yes Parent's are paying it and more. It costs to join, then it costs to participate in the tournaments. And then there is food and lodging to go along with that for Mom and/or Dad and siblings that are dragged along.

All for what. Well the Jones' wants the best for their son or daughter. They want to showcase their son or daughter. They want the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. Very few get it in the end but every parent wants it. A parent does not want the other kid on the block to get an edge on their kid.

I have even heard of club programs paying the people that run these elite showcases so that a student-athlete can gain entrance into these events. "Payola"-Pay to Play. You know what that does...it tells the parents...hey let's join this club because their players are getting into these high profile events.

How about this: what happens when the student-athlete makes the Elite All Star Team but doesn't see the field in his regular high school season. Guess what happens next; the parent heads to the Athletic Director, maybe even by-passes the Athletic Director and goes right to the Superintendent of Schools or to a Board of Education member. Guess what happens next: Coach gets relieved of his coaching duties. I have seen it happen.

Whatever happened to the college coach speaking with the high coach. Those days are over for the most part. I remember when I first started coaching in the mid '60's...and Bob Scott the legendary coach from Johns Hopkins (who by the way was nice enough to hire me as an Assistant Lacrosse Coach and Head Basketball Coach) would have a phone conversation with me and I would say: "Bob, I have a really good attackman (Richie Hirsch-Plainview JFK) for you." Guess what: Richie Hirsch got into Hopkins and was a pretty good player for them. I remember when I was coaching at Hopkins and legendary coach Henry Ciccarone sent me up to Farmingdale High School to watch and talk to Larry Quinn and John DeTommaso. I saw them play and I came back to Baltimore and told Coach Ciccarone- sign 'em up Cic. We did. I remember Coach Desko after a call from me came down to Bethpage High School to see Brain Solliday play football. I had called John and told him about Brian's athletic abilities and his lacrosse prowess. Guess what "Solly" went on to play at "Cuse". I can remember Tom Postel sitting in my office offering David Kelly of Bethpage a pretty sizable scholarship to a long stick middy. One of the best long poles that ever played at any level. Those days are over for the most part.

Recently, I spent some time with my good friend Richie Meade and we talked recruiting. "Jim it has so changed...used to be a guy like you would call and we would take the kid...now I say to my assistant..."hey Jim Amen called and he has a kid for us" --my assistant responds...we have to see film, we have to see the kid play"...Richie says..hey Amen called...they say...we have to see film, we have to see him play"

I have always said "let's stick with current events and not history." So let's do. The sport is growing but in what direction. Coaches are getting fired because they are not getting to the "big dance". What a travesty this past summer with Richie Meade getting canned. What a great person, what a great coach, what a wonderful example of what a coach should be like. What a Leader of Men. Now the high coaches are under the gun. They are not winning, they are not playing the right kids, and they play favorites. Their style of play is criticized both on offense and defense.

Do I think playing in the summer is good-YES. Do I think going to a lacrosse camp is good-YES. Do I think trying out for an Elite Team is good-YES. But the bottom line is that if your kid is good enough he is going to be found. Elite Players are far and few between. The last one that played for me was AJ Haugen of Bethpage H.S. who went on to be a 3-time All-American at Johns Hopkins. He was elite when he was a freshman in high school and he didn't play for any club teams. Petro, Coach Tierney, Coach Desko is going to know. And guess what your kid is going to get recruited. But as I tell all of my parents: You will know if your kid is an Elite player when those guys and others call your son.

So I do hope that the game continues to grow but I do hope that the high school coach is held in much higher regard. They should know who the Elite Players are. The only other people who know are the college coaches.

And how about we add this to the whole equation: Kids today are specializing and not participating in two and three sports. That hurts other programs in our high schools. With the mindset created by all this recruiting paranoia and early recruitment by college coaches kids are not participating in other sports.

Lacrosse unfortunately changed in many ways, some good and some not so good.

It may have been the ugliest win that Alex Rawa, Matt Campanella and their senior teammates had experienced in their five seasons together. But it was also their most beautiful.

Points were hard to come by but the Falcons scored just enough of them to win a county title as No. 2 Locust Valley held on for a 27-24 win over No. 4 <u>Cold Spring Harbor</u> in the county Class B boys basketball final Saturday night at LIU Post.

Rawa is one of many seniors on Locust Valley who have been playing basketball -- and lacrosse and football -- together since eighth grade. They capped their senior seasons as county champions.

"We didn't shoot the ball well; it was an extremely ugly game," Rawa said. "But when you win, none of that stuff matters. I've been waiting for this moment my whole life. This means everything to me."

Chris Appell hit two free throws to put Locust Valley ahead by three with 21.4 seconds remaining. Cold Spring Harbor had one last opportunity to tie the score on an inbounds play under the hoop, but Luke O'Connell's fading corner three came up short.

Campanella had nine points to lead Locust Valley. Rawa and Joe Gilio each had eight. With Cold Spring Harbor looking to take its first lead of the game in the final minute, Locust Valley's Bradley Conn blocked an outside jumper and <u>Josh Brown</u>, who led the Seahawks with eight points, couldn't convert on a turnaround as the shot clock expired.

Ben Jay had cut the Locust Valley lead to three after converting a three-point play to make it 25-22 with 4:10 remaining. O'Connell later made a spin move to create some space and hit a fadeaway to cut the lead to 25-24 with 2:22 left.

"It was really nerve-racking," Campanella said. "But for what we didn't get on offense, we made up for it with great defense."

Rawa scored six of his eight in the first quarter and Gilio hit a baseline floater to open the second quarter as Locust Valley took a 14-5 lead. Cold Spring Harbor's <u>Josh Brown</u> answered with a layup and Bobby Vavassis followed with a putback to help cut the Locust Valley lead to 16-10 at the half.

The loss brought an end to the unexpected run by Cold Spring Harbor. It started 0-7 but qualified for an outbracket game against Wheatley, which CSH won by one point, then upset seven-time defending county champ <u>Malverne</u> in the semifinals.

"I told the guys, just get us in the playoffs and then we're playing with house money," Cold Spring Harbor coach John Cartwell said. "It's been a good run. It's one of those seasons that you hate to see end."

Locust Valley plays <u>Center Moriches</u> in the <u>Long Island</u> championship at 7:30 p.m. March 6 at <u>Farmingdale</u> State.

"It's just a summarization of these kids and how hard they've worked," Locust Valley coach Tim Lomot said. "To win a county championship, it's great for the whole community. It shows the younger kids around Locust Valley that we can play basketball around here."

#### **Durand and defense drive CSH to County Championship**

With the young core of last year's county championship squad returning, <a href="Cold Spring Harbor">Cold Spring Harbor</a> was a heavy favorite to repeat this season. The voyage was not easy, as junior point guard Katie Durand missed the last seven regular-season games with mononucleosis, but the Seahawks persevered. Durand had 10 of her 11 points in the first half and was named tournament MVP, Kelly Vassallo had 12 points and Kelly Gubitosi 11 points and seven rebounds for No. 1 Cold Spring Harbor in a 45-31 win over No. 3 <a href="Locust Valley">Locust Valley</a> in the <a href="Nassau">Nassau</a> Class B girls basketball championship Saturday night at LIU Post.

**Cold Spring Harbor** (17-2) repeats as county champions and wins its fifth county title.

"It feels great. It feels like it took forever to get here," Cold Spring Harbor coach Rory Malone said. "That was our goal from the beginning of the year: to get back to the <a href="Nassau">Nassau</a> County finals. It's almost relieving. I think we had a lot of pressure on us this year. We definitely had a target on our back."

Cold Spring Harbor plays Class C champion Friends Academy in the Nassau Small Schools championship at noon March 3 at LIU Post. The Seahawks also advance to the Long Island championship against Suffolk champion Southampton at 7:30 p.m. March 7 at Farmingdale State.

After coming up short in last year's LIC, Durand said the Seahawks are aiming to take home more hardware this year. "We want it real bad," said Durand, who had four assists and three rebounds. "We want to get further definitely than last year and have a longer season and get our seniors a bit more basketball season. "Said Malone: "It's definitely an important goal for us. Last year, we were kind of wide-eyed and maybe a little happy to be there. This year, it's definitely a goal, we're facing an excellent team in Southampton. We feel like we can put up a fight. "Cold Spring Harbor led 11-6 after the first quarter and opened up its lead by playing great defense during a 15-4 second quarter. The Seahawks held Locust Valley without a field goal for more than 12 minutes spanning from late in the first quarter until 3:57 left in the third quarter and outscored the Falcons 20-7 in that time."Our defense is our main weapon," Malone said. "We play hard. We played hard today the whole entire game on the defensive end. You saw it in the second quarter; it's what we do best."Vassallo, who had three rebounds, found her usual comfort zone with midrange jump shots from the wings."I try and take further shots and closer shots, but it's right in the middle, so they don't really know what I'm going to take," she said. "It's my shot, it's a good range there."Brooke Spallino and Caroline Rawa each had seven points for Locust Valley (13-6). Rawa made a three-pointer with 3:59 to go to cut the gap to 39-29 but the first-half hole was too much for Locust Valley to overcome.

Alex Cantwell had 11 points and Nicole Scuderi had 10 points for North Shore, who faces Glenn in the LIC at 5 p.m. Friday at Farmingdale State.
