Reading and Writing AIS Mrs. Mastracchio Period 5

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Welcome to the Reading and Writing Workshop. In this class, we focus on improving reading comprehension and writing skills especially in preparation for the ELA (English Language Arts) exam, which you will be taking this Spring.

We will divide our time between the classroom and the library. On classroom days, you will have formal reading and writing lessons. In addition to these lessons, we will **D**rop **E**verything **A**nd **R**ead on library days. Of course, you will continue to choose your own books for DEAR Days (AKA independent silent reading). Additionally, you will learn some practical research strategies and note taking strategies.

Course Expectations

INDEPENDENT READING: People increase their reading skills by reading often. Therefore, the class will *Drop Everything And Read* two – three periods per week. At home, you should read your independent reading book as often as possible. *Always have a good book in your possession.* If you don't like a book, abandon it and choose another. If you are close to the end of your book, be sure to have another book on deck!

<u>READING RESPONSES</u>: You will write a response to your independent reading each **DEAR Day.** In general an entry should be a full page (approximately 10 – 15 sentences). Your responses provide me with evidence of the work you are doing during independent reading, so show off. Reading responses should reflect the thinking that is taking place in your head while reading. They should include your insights, reactions, and interpretations to your reading. *Always include specific details from your novel. Responses will be graded.*

READING COMPRHENSION ACTIVITIES: We will also work on reading comprehension strategies and ELA practice tests using the *Eccentrics* workbook.

WRITING: Class assignments will include a variety of writing tasks from writing a cohesive paragraph to writing a well-organized essay. Writing tasks are designed to sharpen your writing skills. *Areas of concentration include conveying clear meaning, developing and organizing ideas, using specific and sophisticated language, and using proper conventions.*

<u>AUTHOR STUDY RESEARCH PAPER</u>: During the semester you will learn how to research utilizing the school's databases and research techniques learned in class. You will learn to use parenthetical citations in your writing.

<u>CLASS PARTICIPATION</u>: A positive attitude is the key to success. Your enthusiasm for reading and writing is contagious and will help build a positive reading community. Since reading well and writing well require thinking critically and deeply, you will want to **put your best effort forward everyday**.
