below by the time that you finish the book. I would like your reading to be an active

rather than a passive experience. Please give the book a chance! I truly think that it

might change your view of WWII and the events that occurred before and after the

war. Even Steven Spielberg agrees! He is or has already made a movie about this. I

would like that to be our first field trip, to go and see the movie.

- 1. Highlight and reflect upon the various personal experiences that the characters in the book go through.
- 2. Based upon those many events, what characterizes the United States prior to World War II?
- 3. Based upon those many events, what characterizes the United States after World War II?
- 4. There are many acts of courage in the story. Highlight and take notes on those acts of courage to be retrieved and reflected upon at a later time.
- 5. Take notes and reflect upon events that <u>surprised</u> you in the book.
- 6. Take notes and reflect upon events in the book that <u>inspired</u> you.
- 7. Take notes and reflect upon events in the book that made you sad.
- 8. Make a list of questions throughout your reading experience that we can discuss when we meet in September.
- 9. Make a list of topics that you would like to know more about.
- 10. When you are done reading the book, take some time to react to the book reflecting upon whether or not you liked the book, would recommend it to a friend, whether or not you want to see the movie and overall whether or not you think that his was a good choice for a summer reading book!
