Understanding the New Common Core Standards

The true spirit of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) is to improve our students' overall academic performance and to create change in our nation's public education system. Informed by the standards of other high performing nations, the CCSS are designed to ensure that all students graduate ready for college and a workplace in which people from often widely divergent cultures and who represent diverse experiences and perspectives must learn and work together. The Common Core represents a shift in instructional practices as well as content. Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum & Instruction, Lydia Bellino, discussed the hard work of teachers and administrators over the last two years in selecting materials, programs, and realigning curriculum with the CCSS. It has always been the responsibility of the district instructional leaders together with teachers to thoroughly evaluate instructional materials, but now it is more important with the market flooded with programs claiming to be Common Core-aligned. Even more essential to a quality curriculum is consistent support for our teachers through professional development. This summer many teachers attended math workshops sponsored by our district and writing institutes at Columbia University's Teachers College. This professional development provided teachers with opportunities to experience some of the instructional shifts of the CCSS, walking in the student's shoes in writing and reading workshops and applying the mathematical

eSpark iPad Initiative

Professional Development

Over the course of the summer, (and all year long) most people do not realize the "behind the scenes" professional development that takes place in our school district. There is a myriad of programs and workshops filled to capacity and then some, including Columbia University Teachers College Reading/Writing Project, math and science workshops and webinars, the Virtual Desktop, Parent/Student Portals now K-6, Teacher Grade Books, expanded laptop/computer accessibility, and more. Technology in 21st century learning has changed the classroom to where today's students don't want to power off just because

they're in school. These are tech-savvy children whose lives revolve around multimedia. The most profound way technology can enhance instruction is through the advantage of immediate, real-time assessment and data reporting. This data can help teachers assess students' strengths and needs, determine ability levels, pinpoint foundations skill gaps, and challenge advanced learners. This makes instructional planning more efficient and effective for classroom teachers and administrators. That is why CSH School District has begun utilizing the eSpark iPad Program, using the iPad simply because a PC cannot be utilized the same way anymore. The eSpark iPad Program analyzes each individual child as they navigate personalized learning through a series of quests and different Apps aligned with the common core. These Apps improve and support curriculum on an individual

basis after pulling together profiles from their individual assessment skills. There is a Teacher Dashboard that informs them of students taking too long to get through quests for example. They assign Apps that are vetted for that child, making the iPad device secondary and the Apps being the systemic change for the students. As Director of Technology, John Contess, said, "The instruction is driving the project, not the technology." The enthusiasm of the teachers is contagious, and we wish it could be implemented in every grade. However, due to budgetary concerns, the initial pilot has been selected for First Grade (ELA), 3rd Grade (ELA), 4th Grade (AIS/Special Ed), 7th Grade (writers workshop, AIS), 8th Grade (Math). Denise Campbell, Director of Special Education, shared, "A cap of only 20 teachers was suggested for the training seminar, and 35 teachers signed up − what a great turnout!" □

Dear Resident:

Welcome back to the 2013-2014 school year. We began the year with 1,885 students in our four school buildings. It is the second year of the New York State tax cap and once again through careful planning and strong community support, we have remained within the cap while maintaining a strong educational program and class sizes that are beneficial to our students.

As you read the pages of this issue of "A Report on Our Schools" you will note initiatives that represent but a sample of what the faculty, staff, administration and board have been engaged in throughout the past year. The district has continued working toward thoughtful implementation of the Common Core Standards, and ensuring progress toward our goal of furthering the use of technology, in and out of the classroom. We have expanded the Parent Portal and refined the Virtual Desktop. Our science research program continues to flourish and in collaboration with the Cold Spring Harbor Educational Foundation we have enhanced our in-house science research facility at the High School. The board continues to prioritize capital projects in order to maintain our buildings and grounds. We are beginning to see the fruits of the first year of our energy performance contract as new lighting, energy saving controls, weather stripping, high school ceiling replacement and refrigeration controls have been installed. In addition, the Board continues to be dedicated in our efforts to move forward with our collective bargaining units with the goal of reaching settlements.

As educators and informed residents of New York State we have seen many changes in education over the years and recently we have been challenged by increasing unfunded mandates, a multitude of changes in curriculum requirements and student / teacher assessments, a suffering economy and the tax cap. These factors have tested our ability to plan and maintain a strong educational program while being ever mindful of our fiscal responsibilities and realities. So far, through collaboration and an extremely supportive community we have been successful. We are very grateful to the community for your support of this year's budget.

This fall we will once again be discussing and adopting our annual goals. Community input is invaluable in informing our work. We invite you to attend our monthly business meetings which take place on the second Tuesday of each month at the Francis Roberts Community Center and to check the district website or calendar for scheduled work sessions which review the progress of different initiatives taking place in the district. A Message from the Superintendent...

Dear Community Member:

On September 9th, the CSH Schools opened its doors to 1,885 students – and the Board of Education, administration, faculty and staff are committed to making this year a successful one for each student entrusted to our care. Last May, our residents resoundingly approved a budget that




was within the State mandated tax cap. As a result of strong community support, the district has been able to preserve its longstanding class-size guidelines as well as enhance its extensive academic offerings which, this year, include a new *Virtual Enterprise* business course, *Advanced Placement Physics C*, and expanded opportunities in science research and academic support. In addition, Columbia University Teachers College Writers' Project will be extended to include our Junior High School grades. And because we believe that learning

opportunities extend beyond the classroom, students will continue to enjoy a myriad of athletic and co-curricular opportunities. *Go Seahawks!*

The faculty will also be focusing on furthering integration of technology to enhance student learning. Our first and third grades, along with our special education classes, will be piloting an "*iPad*" initiative using their personal learning profiles to work toward individualized goals in literacy and math. Now that the district has the infrastructure necessary to support "anywhere, anytime" learning, we are extending student access with the addition of 200 new personal learning devices, including tablets and laptops. Use of the "parent portal" will be extended to the elementary schools where parents will have the opportunity to log on through a secure server and view their child's attendance, report card and State assessment data.

Teachers spent a busy summer writing curriculum and receiving professional development regarding implementation of the Common Core State Standards. As a result, our curriculum is more fully aligned and new resources have been purchased to support student mastery of these standards. We have protected our residents' investment in our schools by prioritizing infrastructure improvements in order that our students can learn in an environment that is comfortable and safe. Security remains an ongoing priority and funds allocated through our voter approved Capital Reserve program will be used to enhance the District's camera systems and install exit door sensors that can be monitored via a centralized station. Security professionals will continue to be present on all of our school campuses and the High School will fully implement an electronic identification system for all visitors to the school.

During a period when public education is "at risk" of being eroded by diminishing resources and an over-reliance on standardized testing, we must all remain committed to a quality education for our community's children. We are proud that our High School continues to earn recognition as being among the top 1% of public High Schools in America and that both Lloyd Harbor and West Side Elementary Schools are designated as "High Performing" by the New York State Education Department. Success is not the result of a singular source – it is the entire Cold Spring Harbor school community that defines who we are and what we are committed to. I thank you for your ongoing support. May I wish you and your family a successful year ahead!


West Side Report From Mr. Simon...




vocabulary words to describe feelings.

Magic is the Trick

CSHHS Health teacher, Mr.
Chris Homer was honored to appear
in Newsday on August 25th revealing
a few secrets about the world of
magic and how it has helped him in
the classroom, and in our community.
The Holiday House is just one of
numerous Long Island places Mr.
Homer does volunteer performances.
But his magic isn't exclusive to the
stage. In 1984, Homer graduated

Adelphi U. with an Art degree, he ended up taking the NYPD entrance exam and passed. But instead of training to become a police officer, he spent four months as a disc jockey in the Virgin Islands. In 1986, he began substitute teaching art classes at a NYC public school in Brooklyn. Homer immediately felt like he was in over his head. Homer said. "I was dying for a way to

get their attention when I saw a magic special on TV and said to myself, 'What about magic?' "Homer bought two tricks at The Magic Shop in Hicksville and practiced until he got them down pat before trying them on the class. "The first time I did a trick for my students they had that look of wonder in their eyes and it hooked me," he said. "I couldn't believe that I could do that."

In 1987, Homer decided he wanted to teach health, something his mother had done for 34 years at Adelphi University, and he earned a

master's degree. A year later, he began teaching health for classes at schools across Nassau County for the Health Education Program for Prevention, which is run by the Diocese of Rockville Centre and the Nassau County Dept. of Drug and Alcohol Addiction. He taught 18 years at Adelphi and Hofstra Universities, than started at the Cold Spring Harbor Central School District in 1995, and has been here since.

Homer incorporated magic tricks into his lessons, including when deal-

ing with the topic of drugs. That's when he brings out a "hallucination wheel," which simulates the effects of drugs like LSD. He has the class focus on the center of a spiral wheel, spins it, and then tells the group to focus on his head. "When we looked up his head got bigger, it was crazy," said Brandon Seider, 16, of Cold Spring

Harbor, who had Homer in seventh and tenth grades. "He always has the perfect demonstrations for the topic he's teaching and it really keeps everyone drawn in." While his magic is a selling point, it's Homer's general ability to connect with students that has made him one of the most popular teachers at Cold Spring Harbor, Seider said. Mr. Homer expressed, "It's the look on that person's face at that moment that's priceless, when you can tell they truly believe in magic...and that's why I do what I do."

Mr. Bongino held his first Varsity Code of Conduct night introducing Matt Mayberry; former football player for the Chicago Bears and Indiana Hoosiers. Matt spends his time now bringing out the best in others and helping them reach their full potential in life. He was adamant that high school athletics made him who he is today, and that NOW - these moments in high school will be the most memorable of your life; nothing compares, not even a Super Bowl ring! But, the vulnerability of peer pressure will change your life depending on the decisions you make. He said, "You are who you hang out with." And if you want to be "great" and succeed, you need to have tremendous self-discipline, you need to have a relentless work ethic, you need to realize it's okay to fail because adversity is the best teacher, you need to write goals, and you need to have an unwavering self-belief that you can be great! He left us with a final challenge, "Don't settle for good, when you have greatness within you." Thank you Matt, for your inspiring words.
