## Dr. Shefali Tsabary *The Conscious Parent*

On December 10th the CSH School District was proud to present to the community, Dr. Shefali Tsabary, a clinical psychologist who received her training at Columbia University. She integrates Eastern mindfulness with Western psychology, establishing her as one-of-a-kind in the parenting field. Dr. Tsabary has made multiple appearances on Oprah's *Lifeclass* series. Oprah Winfrey quoted, "This is the most profound book on parenting I have ever read. In my 25 years, I have never heard such revolutionary and spot on advice...a new way of looking at parenting that will change your child's life, and yours." Tsabary is the author of two parenting books – *The Conscious Parent*, and *Out of Control*. Executive Director of Special Education, Denise Campbell, was thrilled and honored to welcome international speaker, Dr. Tsabary, with help from teacher, Jane DeRosa. One of the goals adopted by the Board of Education for the 2014-2015 school year is to enhance the current focus on students' social/emotional health through the provision of additional programs and resources for students and their families. Dr. Tsabary shared her expertise with delightful humor and insight. She engaged the audience with role-play as so many try to achieve being the "uber-parent" yet in reality feel like the "bad-parent" instead being frustrated, angry and disappointed (in ourselves and our children). She shared, parents today live in a competitive culture, in the age of "the race to nowhere" with great

expectations for our children. Nationally we see parents registering 3-4 year olds in ballet, karate, music lessons and sports all feeling that if a child is registered at age 8-9 we are way too late! We have missed the boat! We all want uber-kids, so we have to be the uber-parents right? This ideology has become the culture, and

Dr. Tsabary shared, "It is up to us to change this cultural shift. We have all been unconsciously seduced into the culture of doing so much." Children sense this competitiveness and are stressed feeling "not good enough." We face a nation of kids feeling depressed, stressed, in therapy, and on medication (with a 65% increase in ADD prescriptions over the last ten years). Dr. Tsabary urged us to stop the insanity of this culture. Kids need self-silence, stillness, time for their spirit to emerge. She said 95% of our day is about achievement which she stated, is only an illusion of control. We do, do, do...this is what we teach kids, yet we are losing the connection along the way between the parent and child. "The lynchpin..." Tsabary shared, "...to a successful life is emotional well being, not achievement. Invest in this, otherwise you are missing the boat. Kids want to be seen and heard, and it is about them, not you." - **NYSSMA Honor Ensemble:** The Cold Spring Harbor Jr/Sr High School Music Department announced that five student musicians were selected for (NYSSMA) New York State School Music Association's honor ensemble. Each student performed a NYSSMA level 6 All-State solo during an All-State adjudication festival. Students rehearsed in Rochester for two days culminating in a performance at the Eastman Theatre. 


**Susannah Oster** who is a 6th grader, with 2nd place going to Matthew Ross, also a 6th grader. Both winners competed at the

CSHHS senior and third year "Science Research" student, **Luke Antolin**, has been selected to the prestigious 2014-2015 CSH National Laboratory's Partners for the Future program. Only 13 students from across Long Island were chosen to participate in the program, which exposes aspiring scientists to real medical research. Beginning in September and running through March students learn research techniques and how to design experiments. It is an experience that most high school students don't get; to work with scientists in the biotechnology field and carry out original research in the lab is an opportunity most college students don't have until their upperclassmen years. Director of Research, Mr. Jaak Rausepp, shared, *"The Partners for the Future program is a very demanding program that requires a great deal of self discipline and excellent time management skills. Luke has these attributes which makes him a valuable member of the lab."* Luke is working in Dr. Adam Kepecs' lab. His mentor there is Dr. Hyun Jae Pi. Luke is researching the effect of serotonin on the prefrontal cortex. Specifically, Luke is designing a microdrive which will be attached to the brain of a living mice which will allow him to see which nerves are activated in the brain when exposed to serotonin. When the program ends, there will be a symposium in March, at which he will make a presentation about the work he has been doing. Luke plans to major in statistics and neuroscience next year in college, where he is sure to be a valuable contributor. Good luck! □

## Challenge Day

**High School:** The week of January 12th high school Principal, Jay Matuk, introduced **Challenge Day** to 10th and 11th graders. This unique program was an interactive all-day workshop consisting of thought provoking games, activities, and discussions under the guidance of skilled facilitators who have been conducting this program in hundreds of schools around the nation since 1987. Mr. Matuk shared, “The overall goals of the program are to reduce teasing, stereotyping and bullying behaviors, build empathy, and shift negative peer pressure to positive peer support.” Related issues which were also addressed included harassment, conflict management and substance abuse. Schools report that after *Challenge Day*, new friendships were forged as a result of the shared experience. Matuk added, “It is important to note that during the program students were provided several opportunities to speak about what is really going on in their lives and what they need from each other.” Students shared personal difficulties and experiences with their group. One exercise involved having each group (one by one) share a “two minute listening session” about something surprising they may not know about each other. The results included many hugs and powerful connections made. Challenge Instructor “Lauren” shared, “It only took two minutes to connect with each other. Is it really this easy? Imagine if we did this every day, taking just two minutes to get to know someone.” It was a powerful and emotional day for many of the participants; school counselors and mental health support staff were participants in the program as well as available for students who desired individual support. In addition, CSH staff members were part of the small group exercises used throughout the day and stayed with their group from start to finish. □

## Protein Glows!

The elementary schools continue their collaboration with the CSH Laboratory DNA Learning Center. West Side 6th graders experimented with genetic engineering taught by DNALC Educator, Ms. Katie McAuley. Using Petri jars, beakers of ice, and heat shock baths, students created glowing bacteria GFP (the Green Fluorescent Protein gene). This gene can be found in Pacific jellyfish when they are excited causing them to give off a green light. Students replicated this process by adding the jellyfish gene to E.coli bacteria cells exposed to ultra-violet light. Moving genes from one organism into another is called genetic engineering. It took steady hands and concentration to avoid contamination and create successful results – fascinating! □



## Kindness Challenge

**West Side:** *The Great Kindness Challenge* is an international event in February that encourages students to perform as many acts of kindness as possible in a single week. Last year 500,000 students from across the nation performed over 27,000,000 acts of kindness. West Side was proud to participate and the students stepped up to the challenge! Due to their participation in *The Great Kindness Challenge*, West Side is officially designated as a Kindness Certified School. This year the event included over 2,000,000 students in over 4,000 schools in 45 countries. Each time a student was “caught” doing an act of kindness they received a marble to add to the jar in the office. The official total of marbles earned was 399 beating last year’s total of 383. **Snowflakes on display at The Whaling Museum:** Goosehill first grade science and art classes collaborated to create crystallized snowflakes in a variety of colors and shapes which were on display at The Whaling Museum as part of the Museum's winter theme. During art class the students shaped pipe cleaners to form snowflake shapes. Then in science class they used Borax in mason jars, and boiling water where the pipe cleaners were dipped and cooled overnight. By morning crystallized snowflakes were formed! ## Hour of Code

The entire school district joined in on the largest learning event in history; *Hour of Code*, during Computer Science Education Week (Dec. 8-14). Last year, the CSH Educational Foundation introduced and facilitated an after school program for Lloyd Harbor and West Side. Interested students logged on to join in after school and at home, along with 15 million students who participated globally. This year, the event was adopted by the district, which joined students worldwide to reach the goal of 100 million students in over 180 countries. The computer labs were open before school and at recess for each grade level (2-6) in the elementary schools. Under the guidance of Technology Teacher, Ms. Diehl, elementary students had grade-level assemblies, individual class tutorials, and participated in a school-wide competition. Grades 2-6 completed a total of 115,809 lines of code during the contest! At the Junior High over 200 students participated assisted by both staff and computer science student mentors. Additionally, basic coding skills were introduced in math classes with videos outlining how coding is used in everyday life. Students were encouraged to work at school and at home to complete as many lines of code as they could in one week. Block based coding was taught around fun topics like *Angry Bird* games where students then had the option to share the game to their phone in one click. Computing is a fundamental part of daily life, commerce, and just about every occupation in our modern economy. It is essential that students are exposed to the field of computer science in our K-12 system as it is foundational in transforming the way a student thinks about the world. It not only teaches them about technology, it also teaches them how to think differently about any problem. Computer Science puts students on the path toward some of the highest paying, fastest growing jobs in America. The district’s participation in *Hour of Code* is a statement that Cold Spring Harbor is ready to teach these foundational 21st century skills. In order to ensure that our students are on the forefront of creating technology of the future, not just consuming it, basic coding skills must be taught at a young age. 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
