Summer Camp Academy 2012 @ SUNY Farmingdale

Returning after five successful summers is the Applied Science, Computer and Technology Summer Camp is offered through the School of Engineering Technologies. The program, which starts in July, mixes fun with adventure and provides *middle school and high school* students with hands-on experiences, group activities, peer competition and extracurricular activities. By signing up for either the entire five-week session or individual sessions, students can build robots and computers and models of bridges, airplanes, homes, cars and airports. They can study computer simulation as it applies to careers in engineering, architecture, aviation, manufacturing and transportation.
