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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL **\$POTLIGHT ON...THE \$CHOOL \$TORE**

We all agree - two school stores are better than one!! For several years, the LHSPTG has had what now is called "The Lion's Pride", where parents can buy various items displaying either the LHS or CSH logo. In an effort to continue to build school spirit, Student Council now runs its own version of "The School Store". Here, children do the selling, buying, and ordering. In-stock items include t-shirts, pens, stickers, pencils - just to name a few. And, they all feature Austus the Lion, our LHS mascot! The prices of the items range from 10 cents to \$10 and are posted around the building. When students make a purchase, they are given an 'official' receipt from one of the student council members. The store is open three days a week (Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday) from 8:30-8:50 am, at which time it closes down for the Morning News Broadcast. Faculty and staff also make purchases during these times, including the school shirts for spirit days which have been ordered in adult sizes! The smiles on the faces of the children are priceless. Through this experience, they learn responsibility, accountability, and strengthen their management skills. AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES - DISMISSAL

All students attending an after-school activity will be picked up at the back circle. Please follow the traffic pattern of the PM dismissal (reverse traffic flow). As always, the safety of our children is paramount. Children are not permitted to cross between cars or through the parking lots.

AFTERNOON BUILDING ACCESS

Please note there will be no access into the school after 4:15pm unless it has been previously arranged.

Dear Parents,

Our annual LHSPTG-sponsored *Fall Festival* event will be held on Friday, October 31st. There will be games, dancing, mini-golf and more! We are hoping for good weather so the Festival can be held on the field. In the event of rain, we will be indoors.

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STUDENTS ARE INVITED TO COME TO SCHOOL DRESSED IN COSTUMES. **Please leave at home all masks, props, dangerous accessories, and items that resemble weapons.** Faces should not be completely covered (however accent paint or make-up is ok). Check your child's bag to ensure that what is coming to school is appropriate and safe. All pieces of the costume should be labeled with your child's name. Children who don't want to wear costumes are invited to wear black and orange.

Each grade level is scheduled to visit our Fall Festival at a specific time. Parents are welcome to attend. We ask that visitors follow the same costume guidelines. The schedule is as follows:

If you do choose to pick up your child after school, please understand that you will have to wait in the "pick-up" line. <u>Students will only be released</u> **prior to dismissal for emergency purposes**.
