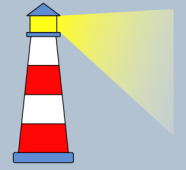

COLLEGE DECISION DAY AND FINANCIAL AID

May 1 is the National College Decision Day, the deadline for admitted students to notify their chosen college of their decision to attend and submit their deposit. If you've already completed the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), keep in mind that financial aid packages are often sent out at different times during the spring. This means it's essential for students and their families to have enough time to compare aid offers, understand the final cost of attendance for each school, and factor in other important elements before making a final choice.

Junior high students have begun to engage in career exploration activities led by Mrs. Pickering and school counseling intern Paul Lehesté. Below are some of the key questions students will be exploring during these sessions.

- **Identify Interests and Passions:** What subjects do you enjoy in school? What activities do you find yourself drawn to outside of school? What do you admire about people who have certain jobs?
- **Assess Strengths and Skills:** What are you naturally good at? What skills do you want to develop? Think about both academic and non-academic skills, like communication, problem-solving, and creativity.
- **Explore Different Career Paths:** Research various careers that align with your interests and strengths. Consider different industries, job roles, and required education or training.
- **Consider Work Environments:** Do you prefer working indoors or outdoors? Do you like working independently or in a team? Do you want to travel for work?
- **Understand the Value of Work:** Learn about different types of jobs, the importance of work ethic, and the value of earning a living.

The junior college planning process is officially underway, and counselors are meeting with 11th-grade students and their families to create personalized action plans. Each student brings unique strengths, interests, goals, and talents to this process, which are all carefully considered. While exploring and applying to colleges can be an exciting yet overwhelming experience, remember that there is plenty of support available. By managing time wisely and tackling each step of the process carefully, students can stay on track—and counselors are here to help every step of the way.

For seniors, final college admission decisions are starting to come in. We are incredibly proud of this exceptional class and celebrate the great news they've received. 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WAIT LIST... Now What????

When college decisions come in, you'll typically hear one of three responses: Accepted (Yay!), Denied (Ugh), or Waitlisted (Now What?). Being waitlisted can be tough, but it's simply a way for colleges to gauge how many students will actually attend before finalizing spots.

If you find yourself on a waitlist, here are some steps to consider:

1. **Do you still want to attend?** If you've already accepted an offer from another school, let the waitlisted college know and thank them for the opportunity.
2. **Review the info.** Colleges manage their waitlists differently, but they usually provide clear next steps (or will if you ask).
3. **Communicate your interest.** If it's still your top choice, let the college know. Keep your grades strong and share any new achievements since you applied.
4. **Be patient.** You'll likely need to submit a deposit to another school before hearing back from the waitlist.
