# Common Nouns

Common nouns are general rather than specific in nature.



# Proper Nouns

- Proper nouns name very specific people places and things:

Mrs. Gaffney      Orlando Bloom

Ernest Hemingway

Long Island      Key West

Gone With The Wind

Proper Nouns are always capitalized.

Titles of books, movies, songs, television shows, bands, etc. are all proper nouns.

First and Last names are also proper nouns.





# Pronouns

- Pronouns are words we use to take the place of nouns when we are speaking or writing. *antecedent*
- John is Nice. I like him.
- Him is the pronoun that takes the place of John.



# Personal Pronouns

- Personal pronouns take the place of a person's name
- Personal pronouns change with regards to gender and number
- *It* is considered a personal pronoun but usually refers to an object or thing.



# Personal Pronouns

- Subject Pronouns: I, You, he, she, it ,we, they
- Object Pronouns: Me, you, him, her, it, us, them
- Personal Possessive Pronouns  
Your, yours, my, mine, his, hers,  
Our, ours
